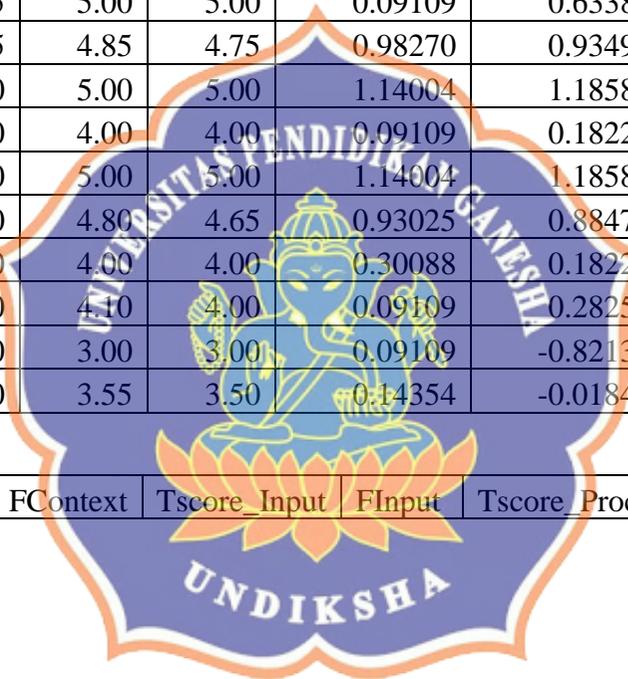

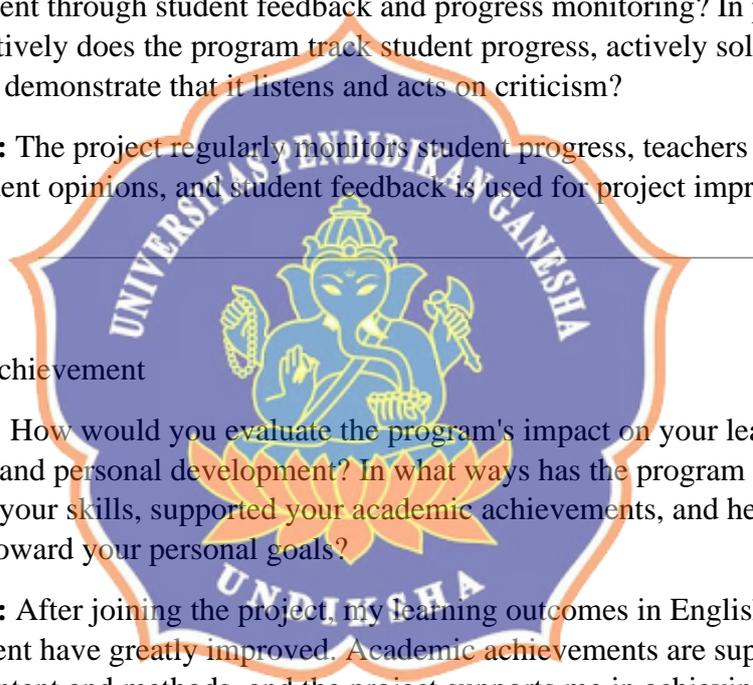
Response: After joining the project, my learning outcomes in English and management have greatly improved. Academic achievements are supported by project content and methods, and the project supports me in achieving personal goals.

Response: The program effectively helps students identify skill gaps by introducing new teaching methods (such as various preschool education concepts)

and providing evidence through photos and videos, making students aware of the narrowness of their knowledge and recognizing the gaps between themselves and the outside world.

Students have problems with being restricted by their parents and not daring to express their ideas, but new knowledge input can make them aware of the existence of gaps.

Stakeholder Analysis

Question: How was your relationship with the project students and principles?

Response: With students: Very good, interacting like friends, establishing good interactive relationships. Students consider me different from local teachers, more like a friend.

With management: No problems, able to communicate honestly with Dean Zheng, Dean Hu, directors, and section chiefs, cooperating with each other to solve problems jointly. The main reason for project progress is that both parties are honest about the problems they face.

Institutional Goals

Question: How has this program helped students connect their personal academic and career goals with the broader mission and values of the institution?

Response: The program helps students connect their personal academic and career goals with the school's mission and values by changing students from thinking they should work immediately after undergraduate graduation to recognizing they can pursue undergraduate studies and develop overseas, with broader life planning rather than being limited to just becoming kindergarten teachers.

We encourage students to pursue graduate studies, making them understand that learning can bring more choices, which students agree with.

External Environment

Question: How would you evaluate the program's effectiveness in preparing students for the globalized workplace?

Response: There are certain obstacles in the program's preparation of students for globalized work environments. Students rely on translation software, and it's difficult to access foreign course books and website information, causing limitations for teachers and students in obtaining international information. For example, when researching message themes, limited website information affects teaching development.

Response: Suggested ways to open courses to global perspectives: Conduct a six-month student exchange program (numbers don't need to be too many) to let students have direct contact with the outside world; if physical exchange cannot be realized, establish online communication platforms between students to promote information exchange. For example, my cooperation with Teacher Zhang Shi, having students from both places exchange teaching methods, received enthusiastic responses.

Program Design

Specifically, in what ways does the systematic content, varied teaching methods, balanced workload, and opportunities for hands-on learning support students' effective engagement and deeper understanding? Response: Advantages: Course burden has been reduced to minimum, homework format changed to classroom completion, activity-based and presentations, promoting students to speak up. Students' resistance to English has decreased significantly, with obvious progress.

Areas for improvement: Course design should allow direct communication between the two colleges rather than through intermediary links to avoid information transmission gaps; hope to participate in the other college's meetings to directly understand operations; suggest monthly one-hour online business meetings for both parties to understand progress, adjust problems, and discuss in-depth issues like student failures and improvement methods.

Partnership Quality

Response: Overall cooperation effect is good. Fuzhou Vocational and Technical College teachers have started encouraging students, participating in exhibitions I organize and giving opinions.

Hope for better cooperation: Teachers from both parties can directly participate in each other's college operations, such as attending meetings; suggest conducting regular online meetings to communicate progress and adjustment matters.

Planning and Management

Response: Overall efficiency and responsiveness: The project's overall efficiency and responsiveness have improved, but there were previous information transmission problems, such as both parties discovering course design issues but not communicating them.

Most reliable aspects: Currently, direct college-to-college communication has solved many problems, such as course exchange subjects being directly connected to Director Hong and section chiefs after meetings between the two doctors.

Improvement suggestions: Fuzhou Vocational and Technical College should provide one-day training including learning platform usage, teaching plan arrangement standards, exam questions and scope, etc., to solve current fragmented communication and lack of systematic understanding problems.

Process

Teaching and Learning

Question: How would you evaluate your teaching quality and instructional design of this program? In what ways do your competency, clarity, and balanced approach to theory and practice support students' learning?

Response: Teaching quality and design: Teaching methods have been changed to bilingual teaching (adding Chinese to PPT). Compared to previous pure English teaching, student resistance has decreased. Teaching methods are oriented toward student understanding, adjusting timely according to student situations, such as changing PPT from text-heavy to keyword expansion and adding pictures.

Malaysian colleagues also adjust PPT according to student abilities, understanding that what applies to Malaysian students may not necessarily apply here.

Weakness: Unable to provide effective additional English reference materials, limiting student understanding.

Student Support

Question: How would you evaluate the quality and accessibility of academic and personal support services provided by this program? In particular, how effectively do resources like career guidance, special assistance for learning challenges, and accessible administrative support contribute to students' academic success and well-being?

Response: Fuzhou Vocational and Technical College has its own student internship and learning arrangements, but tends toward nanny-style education, arranging everything for students. I suggest letting students more independently find jobs and decide internship directions.

Teachers try their best to answer student questions in academic and other aspects, providing strong support.

Communication and Coordination

Question: How would you evaluate the program's effectiveness in fostering accessible, transparent, and inclusive communication and coordination?

Response: The project is quite effective in promoting communication and coordination among all parties. Currently, after direct college-to-college communication, problems can be solved.

Monitoring and Feedback

Response: The project is insufficient in its commitment to continuous improvement through feedback and progress monitoring. Fuzhou Vocational and Technical College has different people managing different content, and may be satisfied with just completing courses for the sino-foreign cooperative education project, lacking deep attention to continuous project improvement and systematic feedback mechanisms.

Response: The program has a positive impact on students' learning outcomes and personal development. Bilingual teaching improvement is obvious, students' abilities in presentations and other aspects have improved, and resistance to English has decreased.

Student failure situations exist and need in-depth discussion between both parties on causes and improvement methods.

Response: Students have employment capabilities in teaching and can master market-required skills.

However, teaching practical experience needs accumulation. The school can only try to share cases, and students need actual hands-on teaching to cope with challenges.

Response: The program makes positive contributions to the overall development, reputation, and educational quality of both colleges (Southern University College and Fuzhou Vocational and Technical College). I will bring back and share what I see and learn here, and also bring Malaysian experience to students here.

Response: Intercultural awareness impact: Students learned about Malaysia's linguistic diversity (such as speaking Hakka, Hokkien, Cantonese, etc.), recognizing that second languages can be learned from daily life rather than just for exams.

Social experience impact: Changed students' narrow thinking of "studying preschool education means becoming preschool teachers," letting them understand that preschool education majors have various career choices (such as developing preschool educational materials and toys, becoming parenting knowledge influencers, engaging in special education-related work, etc.), and hoping they will bring this thinking into the local educational environment.

Response: English ability improvement: The project effectively improved students' English abilities by offering more IELTS courses and bilingual teaching in professional courses. For example, students persist in reciting English daily with teachers supervising check-ins. In response to students' feedback about "short class duration and over-concentration," teaching time was adjusted and dedicated teachers were arranged for permanent liaison. Students invested more in English learning.

Effective factors: Students realized the importance of English, and the school's adjustments and support in teaching arrangements and faculty liaison made English learning significantly effective.

Stakeholder Analysis

Question: How was your relationship with the students and teachers?

Response: With students: Very familiar with project students, especially two classes in grades 2 and 3, with frequent communication due to teaching literature courses.

With teaching faculty: Familiar with all relevant matters including instructor arrangements and class advisor arrangements.

Response: Significance for school development: Expanding teachers' perspectives, expanding the school's influence, promoting bilateral exchanges - it's a good project.

Resource Availability

Response: Current course situation: The preschool education major has one early childhood literature course built by Dean Feng that is a provincial quality course. Other courses have not yet reached provincial quality course level. The state encourages vocational education courses to be exported abroad and constructed bilingually in Chinese and English.

Course co-construction willingness and challenges: There are ideas to co-construct courses with Malaysian teachers (such as Teacher Zeng Liwen's Family-Kindergarten Cooperation course), but challenges exist including teachers' professional focus dispersing energy, both institutions needing joint financial and effort investment, and relatively fewer resources at junior college institutions.

Improvement suggestions: Mobilize teacher enthusiasm, select proactive teachers (such as Teacher Zeng), have both institutions jointly invest support, and utilize the commonality of preschool education majors for course co-construction.

Program Design

Question: How would you evaluate the overall design and delivery of this program in terms of its clarity, balance, and practicality?

Response: Talent cultivation plan design: Initially set course hours and other content according to provincial department and cooperative education instructions, combined with our own talent cultivation plan, hoping to learn through foreign instruction. However, during implementation, teachers had insufficient time for attending classes and learning due to heavy teaching loads and numerous administrative affairs.

Course practicality: Selected practical courses such as activity design courses (scientific activities, language activities) taught by foreign teachers, with overall acceptable effects.

Student learning experience: Some students like teachers whose courses are lively in activity format, while others report that some teachers use traditional teaching methods with less practicality and more theoretical orientation, which relates to course nature, teacher characteristics, and student preferences.

Partnership Quality

Question: How would you evaluate the effectiveness of the program's collaboration with foreign partners—particularly those from China—in enhancing students' learning experience?

Response: Effectiveness of partner (Southern University) collaboration: In enhancing students' learning experience, student feedback focuses more on English aspects, while professional course practicality needs strengthening.

Planning and Management

Question: How would you evaluate the overall efficiency and responsiveness of the program's management? What aspects of the program's organization do you consider most reliable, and where could improvements enhance the student experience?

Response: Communication and adjustment: There is timely communication and consultation for adjustments in teaching both online and offline.

Reliable aspects: In class, students like project-based learning, such as having students tell stories, perform, and adapt dramas in literature classes, with high student participation.

Improvement suggestions: Hope teachers conduct more project-based learning. Teaching quality improvement can be demonstrated through foreign teachers giving open classes, participating in teaching competitions, and focusing on student and teacher competition results in guiding students.

Process

Teaching and Learning

Question: How would you evaluate your teaching quality and instructional design of this program?

Response: Teaching quality and instructional design: Overall teaching quality and instructional design are acceptable, with some foreign teachers receiving student recognition. It is suggested to demonstrate and improve teaching quality through foreign teachers giving open classes, participating in teaching competitions, and student and teacher competition results. For example, organizing China-Malaysia cooperative class students to participate in specialized professional skills competitions.

Student Support

Question: How would you evaluate the quality and accessibility of academic and personal support services provided by this program? In particular, how effectively do resources like career guidance, special assistance for learning challenges, and accessible administrative support contribute to students' academic success and well-being?

Response: Academic and personal support services: The school provided special support in student management, arranging administrative cadres as class advisors. However, students have problems such as major transfers and family financial difficulties, affecting their willingness to pursue undergraduate studies.

Career guidance and academic success contribution: Party secretaries and other teachers provide career guidance and encouragement in class, encouraging students to broaden their horizons and use Malaysia's Chinese-speaking environment to pursue further studies abroad. Regarding the problem of insufficient attraction of internship living allowances, students are guided to focus on experience accumulation during internship rather than just income.

Communication and Coordination

Question: How would you evaluate the program's effectiveness in fostering accessible, transparent, and inclusive communication and coordination?

Response: Communication and coordination effectiveness: The project has certain effectiveness in communication and coordination, but can be further deepened.

Cultural exchange and vocational education overseas attempts: Dean Feng mentioned cultural output through live streaming, such as having students tell Chinese myths in English, planning to integrate this into teaching practice week activities as a way for cultural output and student English practice. It is suggested to focus on Belt and Road Initiative, ASEAN-related skills competitions, and connect second classroom activities from both sides.

Monitoring and Feedback

Response: Feedback and progress monitoring: Research is conducted on students every semester to understand situations, collect feedback, evaluate the project, and continuously improve.

Product

Student Achievement

Response: Learning outcomes: The most direct outcome is students' academic performance. Indirect outcomes include understanding of both Chinese and Malaysian cultures and awareness of different educational methods, which have positive long-term developmental effects on students.

Personal development impact: Foreign teachers' teaching and personal example let students feel cultural differences, having certain impacts on students' personal growth and intercultural awareness cultivation.

Employment Outcomes

Response: Skills cultivation planning: More practical courses have been planned in the talent cultivation program to develop students' professional skills.

Response: Contribution to college development: The project has significant meaning for school development, helping to expand teachers' perspectives and school influence. However, current awareness is not high, with people focusing on how many students go abroad.

Project characteristics and improvement directions: Current characteristics revolve around conducting curriculum teaching based on talent cultivation programs. Improvement suggestions include deeply exploring project characteristics, starting from second classroom activities, connecting activities from both sides to let students contact the outside world; establishing independent competitions, scholarships, etc., to enhance project independence and student

belonging; continuously strengthening cultural exchange and vocational education overseas exploration and practice.

Response: The project was designed to address students' employment and undergraduate advancement needs, with course settings, career planning, and practical internships all closely related to the profession.

To meet the differentiated needs of project students (who pay higher tuition fees), the curriculum emphasizes language ability improvement to help them achieve their undergraduate advancement goals.

Stakeholder Analysis

Question: How was your relationship with the students and teachers?

Response: With students: Through teaching, I have a harmonious relationship with students, with some students showing active classroom performance. I have less contact with preschool education students, mainly communicating with teachers who manage teaching.

With Chinese teaching faculty: Daily communication and coordination is frequent with teachers responsible for managing teaching, with less contact with specific classroom teachers.

With foreign (Malaysian Southern University) teachers: Responsible for arranging accommodation and meals for foreign teachers, have met all visiting teachers, and have attended some of their classes.

Institutional Goals

Question: How has this program helped students connect their personal academic and career goals with the broader mission and values of the institution?

Response: As a higher vocational college, curriculum settings, career planning, and practical internships are all employment-oriented for students.

The sino-foreign cooperative education project provides students with more choices beyond domestic undergraduate advancement, including undergraduate advancement in Malaysia and overseas internship employment opportunities.

External Environment

Improvement suggestions: It is suggested that China and Malaysia jointly develop or design courses that can be used in both institutions, improving course compatibility and teacher capabilities, and exploring the possibility of courses "going overseas."

Program Design

Response: Design considerations: When designing the talent cultivation plan, it's necessary to balance courses from both China and Malaysia while considering clarity, balance, and practicality.

Existing problems: Due to the original course design having longer class hours, integrating Malaysian courses led to some Chinese characteristic courses (such as intangible cultural heritage courses) being sacrificed, affecting the balance of courses.

Partnership Quality

Response: Cooperation effectiveness: The cooperation with Malaysian Southern University has enabled students to experience different learning methods. Foreign teachers are popular with students, and students have improved in project skills and comprehensive qualities.

Cooperation mechanism: Through management committee and teaching committee meetings held twice a year, problems are summarized and resolved promptly, with relatively smooth communication.

Planning and Management

Response: Overall evaluation: As the first cooperative project, there were many problems in the management process, but through exploration and communication, most problems could be coordinated and resolved quickly.

Reliable aspects: Accommodation and meal arrangements for foreign teachers and communication coordination mechanisms related to teaching (such as management committee meetings) are relatively reliable.

Areas for improvement:

Early-stage communication: Although communication platforms existed initially, low communication frequency led to problems not being resolved promptly

Continuous improvement: Need to continuously focus on and improve newly arising problems to enhance student experience

Professional course teaching: Some theoretical courses have boring content and need more activities designed to stimulate student enthusiasm and enhance learning experience. This problem exists in courses from both China and Malaysia

Response: Resource investment: The project provides students with separate teachers and dormitory resources, and supports students' study tours to Malaysia.

Support services: In terms of academic and personal support services (such as career guidance and assistance for learning challenges), there are currently insufficient distinctive features compared to regular enrolled students, and strengthening is still needed.

Communication and Coordination

Response: Internal communication: Communication and coordination with foreign partners regarding teacher arrangements and teaching problem resolution are conducted through established mechanisms (such as meetings), which are currently relatively smooth.

The combination of both cultivates more well-rounded students.

The project provides students with international learning opportunities, such as arranging students to participate in study tours to Malaysia and conducting maritime internships (the first batch of students is expected to go early next year), helping students learn from an international perspective.

Stakeholder Analysis

Response: With students: The Vice President meets with students once a year and interacts with them through study tour activities, maintaining harmonious relationships. VIII. TEACHING RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Teaching mode

This course adopts a student-centered, task-based teaching model.

2. Teaching methods

"Talk about China in English" utilizes several teaching methods:

A. Context creation: This course focuses on context creation, activating students' cultural background knowledge about Chinese culture through headings and relevant pictures, and guiding them to try to express themselves in English. This approach is conducive to enhancing students' sense of participation and interest, and improving their ability to express themselves in English and cross-cultural communication.

B. Multiple Activity Designs: The course focuses not only on the transfer of knowledge, but also on the development of multiple skills such as critical thinking and cooperative learning abilities. The course includes a variety of instructional activities designed to increase student initiative and participation, such as pre-reading predictions, post-reading reflections, group discussions, and role-playing.

C. Cultural Comparison: The course also places special emphasis on the comparison of Chinese and Western cultures. In each chapter, there is a special section on comparing Chinese and Western cultures, so that students can better understand the differences and commonalities between different cultures and enhance their understanding and grasp of cross-cultural communication.

D. Self-directed learning: The course provides several bibliographies and rich links to online resources to facilitate students' self-directed and extended learning. It also emphasizes students' self-evaluation and feedback, encouraging them to reflect on and summarize their learning.

IX. ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

Focusing on the multiplicity of evaluations, the student academic evaluation for this course consists of attendance, participation, presentation, conversation, and video work, with specific weightings assigned, as shown in the table below.

Participation: Active and respectful participation in class is required. Participation is measured by a student's active and informed contribution in class discussions and activities, showing interest in the material, and demonstrating through these methods that one has joined the class prepared (by having read the reading materials before class).

Video work: Students will record videos to talk about China according to the materials that they have learned.

Presentation: Students will show presentations to the tutor and classmates based on that they have learned.

Conversation: Students do dialogue exercises using the words and sentences they have learned.
