Appendix 1. Synopsis of The Chronicles of Narnia: Prince Caspian

On the railway station of England, four siblings named, Peter, Susan, Edmund, and Lucy Pevensie were waiting to return after their school's holiday. Everything seemed normal until a strange pull of wind surrounded them, and suddenly shift to a mysterious island by the sea. As they explored, Peter and Susan began to realize that this place might be Cair Paravel, their old castle from when they ruled Narnia. The next morning, they discovered that Narnia had changed. The forests were silent, and no talking animals appeared. When they left the island, they rescued a dwarf being attacked by soldiers. He introduced himself as Trumpkin and revealed that Narnia was now under the rule of a cruel king, Miraz. A young prince named Caspian was fighting to restore the old Narnia, where magic and talking creatures once thrived. Trumpkin told them Caspian's story: after learning the truth about his uncle's evil deeds, Caspian ran away into the forest and met Trufflehunter the badger and two dwarfs, Trumpkin and Nikabrik.

They were surprised to find a human who still believed in Aslan, a wise lion who used to rule Narnia. Together, they gathered old Narnians to fight Miraz, while Caspian blew Queen Susan's magical horn which brought the Pevensies back. Guided by Trumpkin, they start their journey through wild forests and cold rivers. Lucy began to sense Aslan's presence, but the others refused to believe her, leading them astray. When Aslan appeared again, Lucy woke the others, and one by one they saw him too. His roar revived the forest, trees moved, rivers sang, and nature rejoiced. Meanwhile, at Aslan's How, Peter stopped Nikabrik's attempt to summon the White Witch. Later, he challenged Miraz to a duel. Though wounded, Peter fought bravely until Miraz was betrayed and killed by his own men. The Narnians, helped by Aslan's magic and the living trees, successfully restored the peace of Narnia. Caspian was crowned king, and Aslan opened a door for the Telmarines to return to their world. The Pevensies bid farewell and stepped through the light, finding themselves back at the station, time unchanged, but their hearts forever transformed.

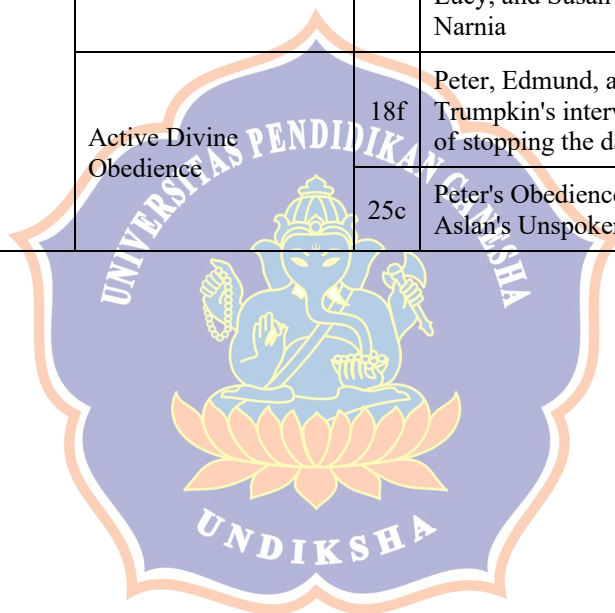
